

ROY G. BOHN 1948

Mr. Roy G. Bohn, well known and highly respected resident of McConnellsburg died at the Chambersburg Hospital, Wednesday night, June 23, 1948, following hospitalization a week prior. Death was due to a heart condition.

The deceased was a son of the late Samuel and Amanda Stouteagle Bohn and was born in McConnellsburg April 19, 1878, hence at the time of his passing was aged 70 years, two months and five days. In 1901 he was united in marriage to Minnie R. Fields and resided in Pittsburgh. Three years afterwards the couple moved to Oklahoma and from there to Chicago, Illinois where Mr. Bohn was employed by the Chicago Street Car Company as a conductor for more than 23 years. Following the death of a daughter Mildred, the Bohns returned to McConnellsburg due to the declining health of another daughter Helen who died May 13, 1933 in McConnellsburg. A son Harry, well known funeral director of Chicago died December 22, 1946.

Left to mourn the loss of a dear one is his beloved wife, a son Roy J. Bohn of Glassport, Penna. and a daughter, Mrs. Caro Jane Middaugh of Beaver, Penna. Two half brothers and a half sister survive: Zola and Thomas Bohn and Mrs. Patrick Rafferty, all of Bridgeport, Connecticut. Four grandchildren also survive.
