—In writing of the death of Mr. Jacob B. Bollinger, which was noted last week, Rev. J. B. Croft who conducted the funeral services says: He was a member of the M. E. church about eleven years. In the performance of christian duties he was faithful to the last. At a prayer meeting a few weeks ago, he sang the chorus "We are going home to die no more." In accordance with a request expressed just before his death, the same was sung at his funeral. The scripture lesson for that occasion was from Psalm 34, 1 to 10 verses. The text was from the 6th and 7th verses, which was his own selection. The funeral was largely attended. He was buried at Centre church on Sunday December 7.

Out Down in his Prime.

We were painfully surprised on Monday evening to receive from a friend the following on the death of one whom we had known for the past 24 years:

After a short recurrence of pneumonia Jacob B. Bollinger, of Taylor, died December 6 instant, aged 46 years, 4 months and 8 days. He had been a worthy member of helpless for his own personal aid; and the community had no kinder or truer friend than deceased. He was a soldier of Company A, 22nd Penn'a. Cavalry and a member of Gen. Albright Post, G. A. R. At our last general election he was one of the commissioner candidates on the Prohibition ticket. Funeral rites by Rev. J. B. Croft, on Sunday at M. E. church at Dublin Mills. Interment at Centre, to which a large number of his neighbors came.
