Doctor Edgar H. MacKinlay, Mc-Connellsburg physician and Fulton county coroner pronounced Mr. Chas. R. Brown dead of injuries on last Thursday morning, August 26, sustained when he was struck by a pass-

ing coal truck.

Brown, a Fulton county farmer was killed instantly by a truck loaded with coal and being operated by Clyde E. Hebb of Waynesboro, Pa., R. D. 3, along the hard road Route 26028 about one-half mile from his farm Pennsylvania State · Police who investigated the accident, said that the truck was negotiating a curve at the time of the accident and apparently Brown was struck un-noticed. Dr. MacKinlay said the accident was accidential and no inquest would be held,

The body was removed to the Robert House funeral establishment in Hustontown and prepared for bur-

Charles R. Brown was born in Fulton county, a son of the late Obel and Hannah Starr Brown on February 6, 1875. For many years he was a successful farmer in Taylor township from which he retired recently.

He was a member of the Clear Ridge Methodist church since child hood where he attended regularly.

Left to mourn his passing is his widow, Rella Chesnut Brown and three daughters, Hazel, wife of M. E.7 Decker of Needmore; Inez, wife of George Crouse of Dott, and Blanche, wife of Elliott Deshong of Saluvia. A brother, Bert Brown of Pittsburgh, also survives.
