

## William E. King Sr.

William Earl King, Sr. died at 5:30 p.m. Nov. 29, as a result of injuries received in a two car collision one-quarter mile north of McConnellsburg on Route 522, in Todd township.

The deceased was born in Altoona on Oct. 30, 1905, a son of Albert and Myrtle (Shaw) King. He was united in marriage on April 21, 1925 to Zola Maude Barnett.

His wife survives along with these children: Mrs. Wayne (Evelyn) Lester, McConnellsburg, Mrs. Hilda King, Annisville, Va., Mrs. Richard (Martha) Ulsh, of Hustontown, Mrs. John (Mary) Sheehan, Brookline N.H., William Earl King Jr. of Waterfall, and Mrs. Wayne (Naomi) Roberts, at home. There are 21 grandchildren.

Fulton county's ninth fatal automobile accident of the year occurred on Monday at 5:00 P. M. when William Earl King, 60, of Waterfall, was killed instantly in a headon two-car collision.

The fatal accident happened on Route 522, about one-quarter mile north of McConnellsburg, at the construction site of the new Route 30 bypass.

King, driving a 1961 Ford Falcon, was travelling north when it collided headon with a south-bound 1961 Ford convertible, driven by Paul Stains, 21, of St. Thomas, RD 1. Both cars were demolished.

King was pronounced dead at the scene by Dr. R. C. McLucas, Fulton county coroner. His death was attributed to a crushed chest, fractured neck and fractures of both legs.

Harper Black, 54, of Three Springs, Star Route, a passenger in the King car, was admitted to the Fulton County Medical Center with injuries of the mouth and chin, a fractured nose and fractured ribs.

Stains was given first aid treatment at the Medical Center and was transferred immediately to the Washington County Hospital, Hagerstown, suffering from a depressed fracture of the skull.

The condition of each of the injured men is listed as serious.

A resident of St. Thomas, Stains roomed at the Nhyle Bivens home while being employed on construction work in this vicinity.

Police said there were no witnesses to the accident which resulted in the Falcon coming to a stop on the east side of the highway, facing south, and the convertible
